Course Outline

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Assessment Outline

In year 13, you will sit three external exams prepared by Edexcel. They will consist of Paper 1, 2 and 3.

Paper 1:

Philosophy of Religion

Paper 2:

Religion and Ethics

Paper 3:

Study of Religion (Buddhism)

Each paper is a written examination and consist of 80 marks. The papers are 2 hours long and represent 33.3% of the A-level.

Careers and next steps

Many of the top universities will ask you to have at least one A-level in a facilitating subject when you apply. RS is a non-facilitating subject which means it should be studied alongside subjects such as English, Maths. Biology, Chemistry, Physics , Languages, History or Geography. At Oxford and Cambridge University Religious Studies is considered in its top level list of 'suitable Arts' subjects. Applicants with RS were more likely to gain admission to study history at Oxford in 2012 than those with facilitating subjects. Most universities consider RS as a rigorous academic subject and the London School of Economics see it as a preferred subject. The Russell Group of top universities has made it clear that RS A Level provides 'suitable preparation' for study at their universities. You could also study a degree in Religious Studies, Philosophy or Theology at top universities.
